Dear Parents/Guardians,

As we approach the Halloween mid-term break I wish to update you on important school news. Our school patron William Lee, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore retired recently. I have written to Bishop Lee on behalf of our school community.

This year the parents association AGM took place on Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> October. There was a good attendance and current issues were discussed. Sincere thanks to all committee members who stepped down after their three year term.

I wish to welcome new teaching staff to our school. Emma Tallon and Katie Slattery join us as permanent members while Neil Kirwan, Philip O'Leary, Máire Byrne and Maria Hayes are with us for the 2013/2014 school year.

On Monday 23<sup>rd</sup> of September 2013 our school Board of Management arranged a School Improvement Plan Facilitation and Training

Day for all staff. It was an essential first step as we implement the Department of Education and Skills school self-evaluation guidelines for primary schools. Working groups have been established and the following areas have been prioritised: Learning support teaching, Autistic spectrum disorder classes, Roles and communication, I.C.T. development, Enrolment, Expectations of out of class behaviour, Support structure for staff and School year planner. Parents/guardians input will be sought in some areas and I will circulate a progress report before Christmas.

We continue to work on recommendations from our 2012 W.S.E. Report. This term we started a creative writing initiative for all 26 classes. We developed a senior library space and there is an on-going review of our English reading schemes. Sincere thanks to all parents/guardians who are visiting classrooms and assisting infant teachers with the 'Aistear' programme.

The Board of Management completed an annual review of our child protection policy recently and will commence a review of our anti-bullying policy in line with the Department of Education and Skills circular 45/2013 in November.

Cllr. John Cummins Mayor of Waterford visited our school on Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> October. He launched a primary schools exercise and health eating competition and presented forty five certs to pupils who had full attendance last year. I wish to acknowledge our pupils' attendance here at St. Mary's. We had a 95% rate recorded for 2012/2013 school year which is exceptional!

Finally, I wish to extend a special welcome to all pupils and families who started in St. Mary's N.S. this year. Enjoy the mid-term

## **Car Park Safety**

We are urging all parents to **please drive safely** at all times when dropping off/collecting your children from the school. Please **do not stop in the yellow boxes** at the entrance to the school and make sure that you use the system correctly. Be mindful of over-hanging car boots if you park your cars at the school walls as you may be obstructing the pathway to the school gate. ## **Rainbows**

Rainbows is a peer-support programme to assist children who are experiencing a significant loss in their lives through a death or separation in their family. Rainbows helps by providing a safe setting in which children can share their feelings, emotions and struggles with others who have similar experiences. They are supported in this process by a trained facilitator during one lunchtime session per week. It is suggested that a nine month period would pass since the time of the bereavement or separation before joining a Rainbows group. If you are interested in your child joining a Rainbows group, please contact Fionn Smith (teacher in 3<sup>rd</sup> Class) by Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> November - immediately after the mid-term break – so that the groups for this year can be organised.

## GARDEN NEWS

As you may know, our greenhouse suffered major damage during the storms earlier this year. The panels of polycarbonate were blown across the GAA field. Some were badly damaged and needed to be replaced. This process proved more difficult than anticipated. Thankfully, John McGuire of McGuire's Garden Centre, sourced replacement panels and arranged to have them installed at his expense. We are extremely grateful to him for all of his help. He also arranged that wire supports were put in place to help prevent panels being blown out in the future.

The greenhouse is fully functional now. There are some tomatoes growing there and parsnips which are ready to harvest. We have a wonderful supply of strawberry plants, with new plants growing on the runners. It is hoped to take cuttings of shrubs and root them in the greenhouse over the winter. Cuttings of plants that are beneficial to bees and butterflies would be most welcome if you have any to donate to the school.

This year we have harvested Red Cabbage, Courgettes, Onions, Peas, Beans, Lettuce, Potatoes, Strawberries, Apples and Beetroot. If you are passing the garden you may notice the tall Fennel plants grown by Ms Hayes' class last year. You will also see the beautiful display of French Marigolds that have helped to keep the green fly at bay in the raised beds which were planted by the Second Classes. Many classes have studied the garden since September, noting the plants growing there and the many kinds of insects and birds that frequent it. With winter fast approaching, do remember to feed the birds. In the coming weeks a general clean-up will take place in the garden. We will also be involved with the Green Schools Committee in the work for the Biodiversity Flag.
